





New El Chaparral Port Of Entry

The *San Diego Union-Tribune* reports that the Mexican government is firm in its plan to open its new state-of-the-art El Chaparral port of entry at the San Ysidro border crossing this November, even though the new access roads on the US side are not built, nor even funded.


Avenida Revolución's Revolution

Perhaps no street in Tijuana has been better known to American tourists over the past half century than Avenida Revolución. Whether it was shopping for clothing, jewelry or leather goods, being photographed with the zebra-striped burro, enjoying some tasty *comida Mexicana*, or taking in some rowdy bar action, Revolución was the place to go.

That's all changed during the past decade. With the dwindling numbers of Americans, many afraid to cross the border, most of the small shops and many of the restaurants catering to tourists have closed their doors.

But Revolución has been undergoing its own revolution. A new Avenida Revolución is evolving filled with new art galleries, bookstores, restaurants, cafes and bars.

And not catering to the American tourists, but to Tijuana's residents—the young and the hip as well as the older and more affluent.



Three new arts passages have opened in the past few years and festivals to attract the locals are well attended. Even Caesar's Restaurant (home of the famous salad), taken

over by Tijuana's Plascencia family (owners of several of Tijuana's top restaurants) has re-emerged as an exciting dining venue.

So the next time you're in Tijuana, check out the revolution on Revolución.

New Wine Museum In Guadalupe Valley

Mexican President Felipe Calderón attended the early August opening of the new Guadalupe Valley Wine Museum built by \$5.3 million from both state and federal funds. The museum features interactive displays and an outdoor amphitheater. Intended to highlight the history and tradition of wine-making in the valley, the museum is located at kilometer marker 81 on highway Mex 3 which connects Ensenada with Tecate.



Bodegas de Santo Tomas



South of Ensenada in the Santo Tomas Valley, you've no doubt noticed and wondered about a modern, circular building (pictured) built a number of years ago. Surrounded by vineyards and on the east side of Mex 1 at kilometer 49, it is part of the Bodegas de Santo Tomas operation. Discover Baja members who have visited recently, tell us that it is open from 11:00am to 3:00pm, and if you call ahead to their Ensenada office [646 178-3333] tours can be arranged.

Expedited Passport Processing

Passport processing can be expedited by scheduling an appointment at the downtown San Diego Passport Agency at the Columbia Center, 401 West A St. 10th Floor, San Diego, Ca 92101

Appointments can be scheduled 24 hours a day, 7 days a week using their automated appointment system at 1-877-487-2778. When calling the automated appointment system, you will hear that travel plans are required; however this requirement does not apply to this agency. You must, though, pay the \$60 expedite fee. Passports will be issued within five business days of applying at the agency. During your



appointment, the agency will advise how the passport will be sent to you. This agency can issue both the U.S. passport book and the U.S. passport card on-site.

Appointments are available from 8:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. Monday through Wednesday and Fridays; as well as 9:30 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. on Thursdays (excluding Federal Holidays).

Tecate Crossing With A Big Motor Home

One of our DB members who takes a large motor home across the border at Tecate, recommends parking the motor home on the U.S. side of the border, walking over to get your tourist visas stamped, then returning to drive the motor home across the border. Sounds like good advice since finding parking (in order to get visas stamped) for a motor home once you cross the border can be a challenge.

Baja Hunting

Member Gordon Maddock writes that although much of DBTC's focus is on other parts of the Baja peninsula, many of my friends and I have homes and trailers on the Colorado River where we hunt waterfowl, as well as in the Mexicali Valley and the Valley of Trinidad where we hunt dove, quail and pheasant. Some of us have homes in San Felipe, and once a year hunt Brant (geese) in San Quintin.

Those of us who hunt, use Arturo Malo at Baja Hunting and UMA K57 to obtain licenses and arrange hunts as we have for many years. There are other outfitters but these guys are the best.

Knives In Baja


Another member sent a reminder that it is illegal to carry a knife on your person in Mexico, even a pocketknife. You could be arrested and charged with possession of a deadly weapon, spending weeks in jail waiting for trial, and tens of thousands of dollars in attorney's fees, court costs, and fines. If convicted, you may be sentenced to up to five years in a Mexican prison. Keep those knives in your fishing tackle box or tool kit.

Registering Travel In Mexico
